Foster Care

In Western Australia there are a number of children and young people living with disability or other complex needs. Many are waiting to be placed in loving, family environments and until a suitable home can be found, they remain in emergency accommodation or a residential facility.

UnitingCare West Futures Foster Care service recruits, assesses, trains and supports Foster Carers. Have you ever considered opening your heart and your home to become a foster carer?

Carers are women and men of all ages and walks of life. They come from different cultures and backgrounds, financial and domestic circumstances, some are single, some are married, some have their own children while others don't.

What's important is they are warm, loving and confident people, fully prepared to make a long-term commitment to nurture and support a child's growth and development with empathy and compassion.

Troy was 11 when he entered the Futures Foster Care program. Due to a mild intellectual disability, he was moved into a new school where he met educational assistant Tina. The bond was immediate and after assessment and training, Troy became part of the family and has been living with Tina and her family for 9 years. It has been a very rewarding experience, as Tina explains:

"When I fostered Troy I took it on forever, I was committed, I was committed to anything that came our way because I knew with the love and support I had for him, we would beat all the challenges and get the rewards.

My hope for his future is getting a car, so he has his independence, getting his own little place, close to here because I don't want him too far from me, but total independence. I want him to know how to budget, how to take care of himself and his home, but he'll always come over for Sunday dinners with the rest of us. His career is taking off and that's his forever, maybe a girlfriend and a marriage down the track... grandchildren would be nice.... And I see all that for him, he's a very clever man."

There are children and young people in our community desperately missing out on the love and support that will make a world of difference to their lives. By becoming a foster-carer you will be creating a brighter future, like Tina and her family, for a child in need and setting out on a journey that will be challenging but endlessly rewarding.

The young people who are living in supported accommodation through UnitingCare West have experienced a history of trauma and are living with a disability and/or complex medical care needs for which a therapeutic garden has many benefits.

We are thrilled to announce a partnership between master gardener and celebrity Sabrina Hahn and UnitingCare West.

Sabrina has provided her assistance pro bono, helping to

plan and implement the first of four therapeutic gardens, which will contribute to even better outcomes for the children, young people and adults supported through UnitingCare West's disability support services.

Level Up's big bike swap at Tranby

Bike Swap provides repaired pre-loved bikes to people experiencing homelessness at UnitingCare West's Tranby Centre.

The initiative was launched in January by UnitingCare West's Level Up program where jobseekers, who are undertaking a training program to develop their employment and professional skills, are repairing old bikes so that they look like new again.

The jobseekers who are participating in the Level Up bike rescue program are supported by atWork Australia jobseeker program. Together they refurbish old and worn down bicycles. The participants collect bikes from donors or source them from verge collections. The state of each bike gets assessed and the



jobseekers make a plan for each bike to clean them up and make them roadworthy.

Level Up jobseekers put together a manual to go with each bike that includes practical tips for bike maintenance and safety. People experiencing homelessness can then register for a refurbished bike at UnitingCare West's Tranby Centre. Alternatively, they can bring their old bike and swap it for a bike that was refurbished by Level Up. We encourage people to cycle safely and therefore each client receives a driver's safety kit which includes a helmet, lock and drink bottle.

All the bikes are inspected and taken to a professional bike repairer for a safety inspection and a test before being handed out to clients.



Plastic recycling program at Food Rescue

Recycling plastics so that they can be turned into plastic bins and chairs has become part of the daily business at UnitingCare West's Food Rescue.

The service is separating an estimated four cubic metres of plastic at the moment, including supermarket packaging for fruit and vegetables that we rescue. Instead of depositing plastics at landfill, this new system helps the environment by recycling plastics.

Each week, Food Rescue recycles four different types of plastics that are picked up by a company called CLAW Environmental. CLAW melts the plastic down into a form that can be used in the remanufacturing process to make various products.

CLAW also collects the foam boxes that some foods are transported in. They are compressed and sent to China, where they are turned into coat hangers and floor boards.
